Agency Mission

The Lake Anna Advisory Committee (LAAC) was established in 1994 as a “joint administrative committee” by the three counties surrounding Lake Anna (Spotsylvania, Louisa and Orange) along with Dominion Energy to address matters of joint interest pertaining to the lake and its adjacent shore lands. Its purposes include: to promote cooperation and coordination; to develop recommendations for new/revised ordinances relative to the lake and related land areas; to promote natural resource planning and management, and environmental quality maintenance; to administer the on-lake marker and buoy program; to control and manage undesirable aquatic weeds (e.g., hydrilla) and pollution in and around Lake Anna; and to meet and work with all local, state and federal agencies regarding recommendations to carry out the purposes of LAAC.

Agency Overview

Purpose/Description

Lake Anna is a 13,000 acre reservoir at the intersection of the three counties involved. It was created by Virginia Electric and Power Company (now Dominion Energy, Inc.) in 1972 to provide cooling water for the North Anna Power Station by damming the North Anna River, one of the principal tributaries of the Pamunkey and York Rivers flowing into the Chesapeake Bay. It was also designed as a major recreational lake and area to the benefit of all local residents, visitors, vacationers, the adjacent counties, Virginia and the mid-Atlantic region in general. It is clear that a focus on human life, water quality, boating safety, pollution, recreation, wildlife, fish and fishing conditions, and related environmental factors – the scope of LAAC's mission – is essential to the continuing success and well-being of our region and lake users.

Justification of Agency and Requested Funding

As a safety, environment and management focal point, LAAC is engaged in numerous issues of direct and indirect interest to Spotsylvania citizens. The major issue related to this funding request is boating safety and the need for an approved and managed system of navigation aids, in the form of Virginia regulatory markers. There are two types on Lake Anna (33 of 64 in Spotsylvania): hazard markers to make boaters aware of dangers lurking below the water so they can avoid property damage and personal injury; and no-wake markers to slow down boats at bridges (similar to flashing amber lights and caution signs on our local roadways). Another LAAC issue is the control and management of hydrilla, an invasive aquatic plant that has returned to the lake; however, funds are still available for the near-term from a Commonwealth grant back in the 1990s.

Program Collaboration

At the local level, LAAC maintains an ongoing and close relationship to each of the three County Governments, since a Supervisor (and alternate) is a designated committee member and each county Administrator is an ex-officio member. A good example of ongoing collaboration is the County Supervisor's Resolution on wake-surfing. LAAC also maintains a close working and management link with Lake Anna Civic Association, which provides many of the volunteers for water quality monitoring, hydrilla management and the buoy program. At the state level, LAAC and its partners work closely with many agencies – DGIF on boating safety, buoy and hydrilla control issues, as well as DEQ and VDH on a broad range of water quality, pollution, health and environmental matters. Finally, we maintain an excellent collaboration with Dominion Energy, via their LAAC membership role. They provided \$5000 funding toward hydrilla control in FY2016 and \$2000 for private-side buoy maintenance in FY2018.

Collaborative Impact

LAAC and its partner agencies and organizations have developed a high degree of effective interaction and coordination, with many positive programs and results that benefit the county and its residents, visitors and vacationers. Program Audience and Service Delivery

LAAC's mission, scope and list of issues are vital and have grown with the expanded population of the county and region over the past 10-20 years. The buoy program in particular directly responds to the needs of new boaters, who may be more familiar with waters that have published charts and other tools to help them navigate safely. Lake Anna does not have the typical marine chart common to the tidal rivers and Bay so the buoys are critical to safe boating. The hydrilla program (funded by grant) includes lake-wide surveys by volunteers and reporting tools for HOAs and individual property owners to advise us of their problems along their waterfront, cove or area that pose obstacles to boating, swimming or any other use of the lake.

Community Impact

Please provide at least two examples of how your services have impacted members of our community.

An ongoing county issue has been citizen concern about the increase in property damage, personal injury and risks, and dangerous boating incidents caused by the growth of wake surfing on the lake, particularly in the Terry's Run area of the county. Under its standing Safety Committee, LAAC gathered a broad group of local citizens, experts and sport enthusiasts to consider the matter, leading to a recommended approach that was adopted by Spotsylvania and Orange county officials and has gone up for further consideration under Virginia DGIF regulations and procedures. Hydrilla has come back to the lake, creating areas where the thick growth makes boating difficult or swimming and other water activities impossible. The 2015-17 combined approach – limited and safe herbicide treatment of specific problem areas, coupled with the limited introduction of grass-eating carp for the long term – marked the beginning of a sound management program that will benefit residents and visitors in coming years.

LAAC uses volunteers entirely for its management, buoy maintenance, water quality and environmental monitoring, and all other projects and activities. All positions are by appointment to the Committee by the member Counties and are without pay or benefits. No increases in Salary/Benefit Costs are planned, requested or foreseen in the future.

Operating expenses for buoy maintenance, repair and parts have been growing throughout the commercial market regularly the past several years, and is a major reason for increases. However, there is a growing amount of planned work that has not been carried out because approved funding has routinely come in below requested amounts. Hence, each year includes a 'catch-up projects' portion that should have been performed in an earlier year. In addition, LAAC management is actively looking for additional boating safety measures and improvements to counter the recent growth in accidents and deaths on Lake Anna. Expenses for the hydrilla program, which are funded by a grant from many years ago rather than current funding requests, is carried out through a well-planned long-term managed approach designed to control the invasive hydrilla problem but to avoid destroying all desirable grasses and weeds that maintain a successful ecological balance. This plan is intentionally designed and managed to be effective but conservative, with the constant goal of conserving grant funds as long as possible to delay major additional funding requests for the longest time possible.

There are no Capital Outlay Costs for buoy maintenance program or any other LAAC project or activity. LAAC does use some donated capital equipment for the buoy program. Total capital requests for FY2019 are zero from all counties served, and are foreseen to remain at zero in the future.

LAAC constantly monitors state and local legislative issues, and sometimes participates in their consideration, that may affect the lake and its environs, but there is nothing foreseen at this time beyond the wake-surfing Resolution matter. As a general boating safety factor, Lake Anna is seeing more nighttime boating and has initiated an effort to add lights to all buoys to help avoid boat collisions with them and the resulting repair costs and/or replacement. This is an example of the urgent need for full funding of our request, so that ALL buoys can be modified sooner rather than later.

Agency needs and areas of concern have been addressed adequately in this funding request. There are no metrics that detail the use of the lake and its surrounding shorelines by county, gender, race, age group or income level. All portions of the three county lake areas are used by residents, visitors from across the region, and vacationers who rent or stay at motels and campgrounds. Over three million recreation hours occur on the lake each year, with most of the use occurring in the late Spring to late Fall timeframe.
